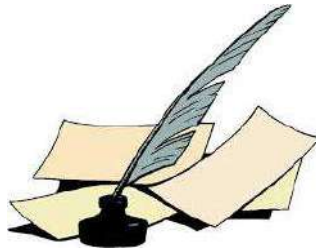

It was the year 1981, a devastating flood entered roaring in a part of the State which is associated with deserts and arid climate in our country. It destroyed many villages and caused irreparable damage to life and property. Studies and statistics showed the rural community was deprived of the basic amenities of life and there was a 75% downfall in the agricultural production. Livestock production also staggered around 10-15%. Lack of employment and inability to even feed the family led many villagers to migrate towards the cities. Illiteracy and immense crisis of healthy atmosphere were at their peak. Many organizations came forward with short term relief packages but the gravity of the situation was such that it demanded some firm initiative to strengthen the community and bring about a positive change in the lives of the villagers. In the aftermath of this havoc, a young man who was working with different voluntary organizations, felt the pain of the community and took the initiative to mobilize the youth towards one common cause of organizing the fragmented society and finding out the solutions of their problems and bringing a positive change in their lives.

Our Journey Continues....

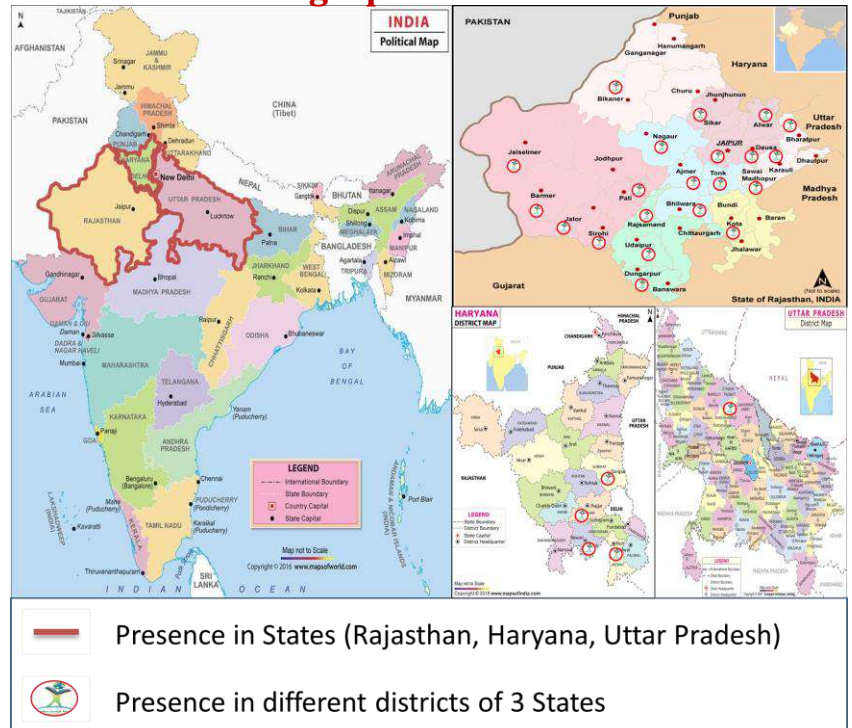

We strongly work as a catalyst agency and help the corporate to achieve their CSR goals by bridging the gap between them and the target communities.

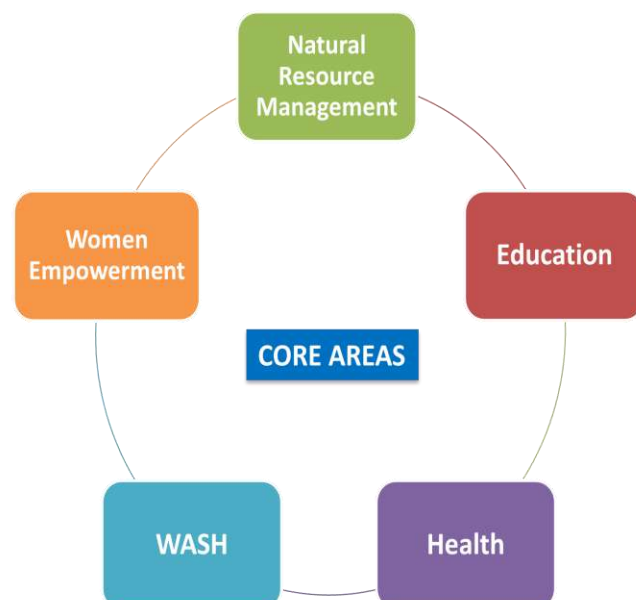

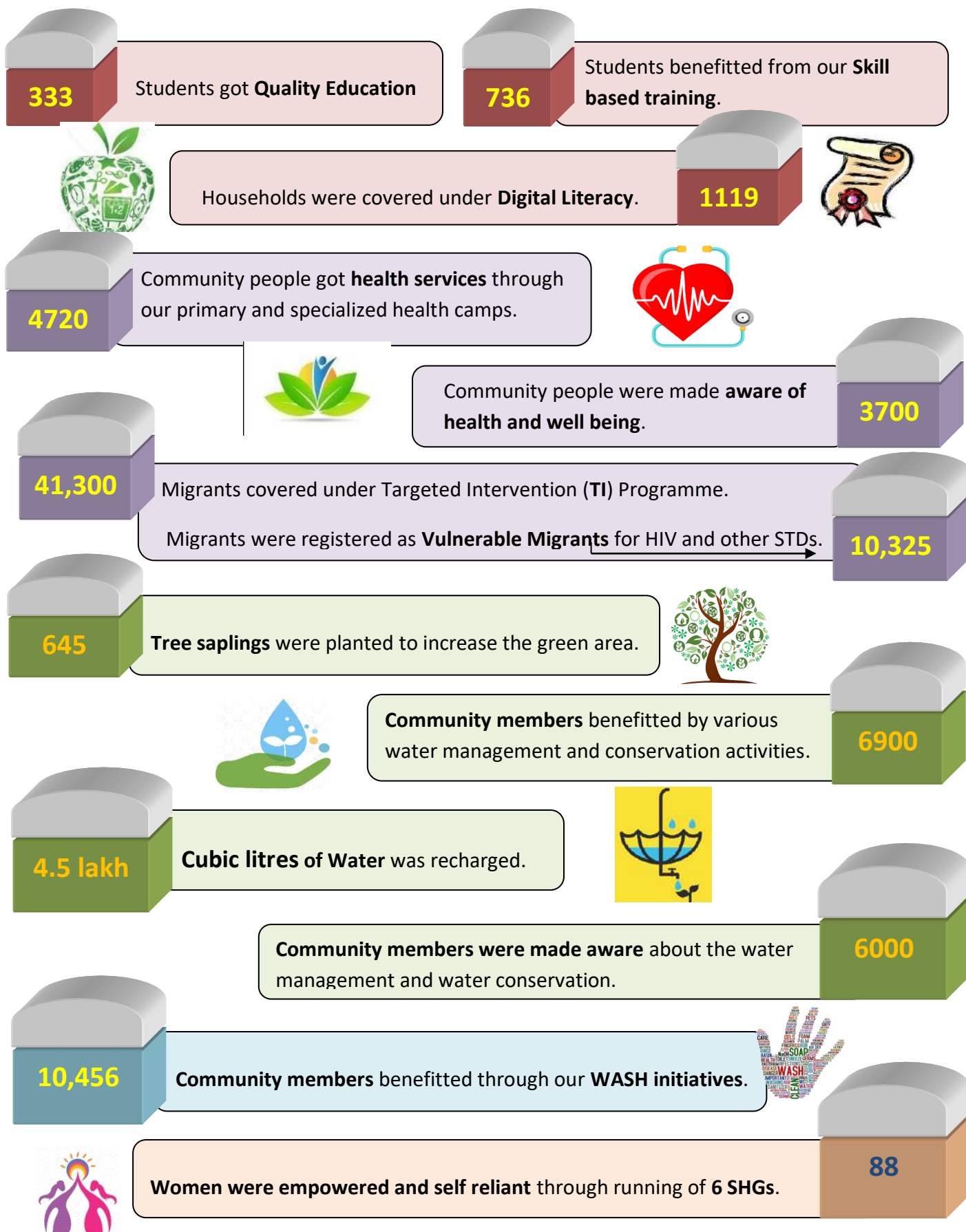

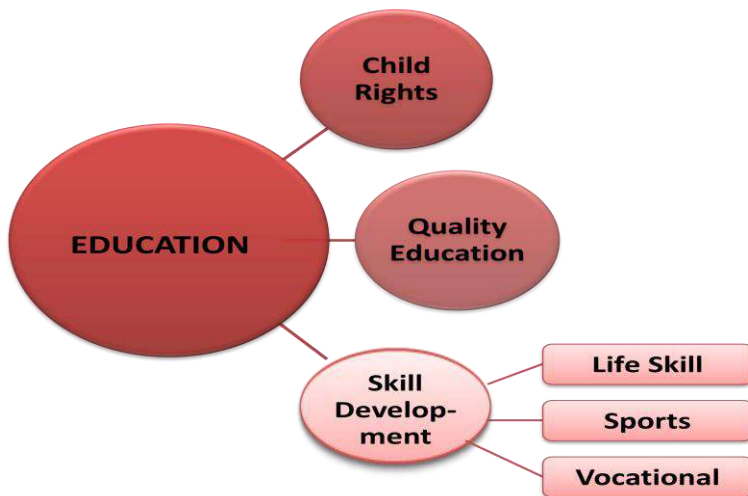

1. EDUCATION



Education: GSS focuses on the holistic development of the children by advocating for child rights and promoting quality education and skill development trainings. Main activities:

- Advocacy of Child Rights especially Right to Education.
- Promotion of girl child education and making school infrastructure safe and secure with respect to girl students.
- Promotion and development of child friendly and safe environment in school by ensuring community participation and behavioral changes in primary duty bearers, parents and children.
- Strengthening of SDMC/SMC, PTA and promoting accountability in PRI.
- Teacher's Trainings on Joyful Learning methods and behavioral development.
- Promotion of Co-Curricular activities in school.

1.1 Child Rights: We aim for holistic child development by advocating for child rights which are ensured by Constitution of India and by the global bodies. A child is any person who is below the age of 18 years and has guaranteed rights against exploitation and abuse (given in table 1).

1.2 Quality Education: According to the Annual Status of Education Report (ASER) 2016, only 47.8% students of class V can read class II level text. The proportion of all Class VIII students in rural India who can divide a three-digit number by a single-digit is 43.2%. And while 32% of children in Class III could read simple English words, in Class V, only one out of every four students could read an English sentence. To improve this statistics it is essential to strengthen the education sector qualitatively in the rural regions and we are contributing from our part by taking up the cause under different projects focusing on teachers' training programmes on **joyful learning methods, discipline and positive discrimination** and child and youth development activities including **co-curricular activities, bridging classes for weaker students/ drop outs and formation of students' resource centre, children's clubs and conducting students' meetings (Bal Sabha)**. We also ensure connecting the rural population to **digital education** platforms and avail proper e-learning tutorials.

1.3 Skill Development: Skill development is important to increase the efficacy and quality of labour for improved productivity and economic growth. It is a powerful tool to empower individuals and improve their social acceptance. GSS has three interventions dealing with this:

Life Skill Sessions

- Empowering the youth to act responsibly, take initiative and take control.
- Enables them to rise above emotional impasses arising from daily conflicts, entangled relationships and peer pressure, so that they are less likely to resort to anti social or high risk behaviours.

Sports

- Developing mental skills, self-awareness and the ability to understand and work with other people.
- Sports as a career opportunity.
- To make youth physically fit and conscious about their health and fitness.

Vocational Training

- Enhancing the practical skills and expertise of learners to make them more employable.
- Enhancing the skill set for a specific trade/industry.
- Empowering skilled youth to take up opportunities in future for financial independence.

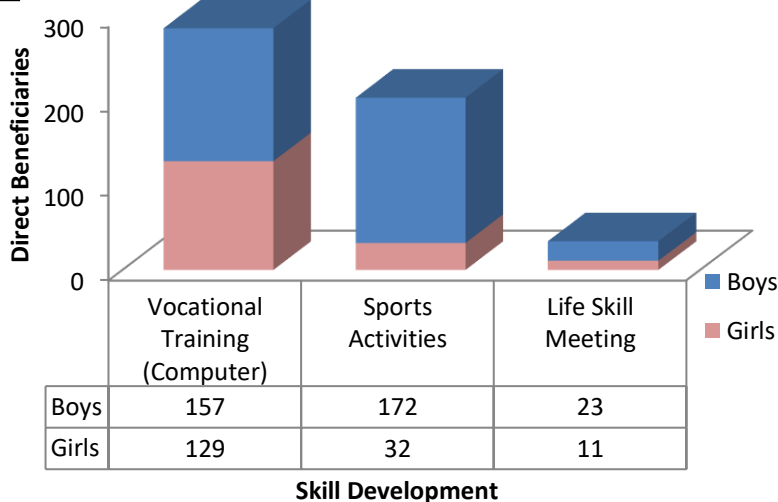
➤ Vocational Trainings:

Case Studies: Finding Ruksana's Second Chance and Kartila's Confidence

Ruksana, a 13 years old girl from Firozpur Namak village, Nuh, Haryana, was a studious, brilliant and regular student of class VIII at Government Senior Secondary School of the village. But in 2016 her parents suddenly decided to stop her further schooling and in their own words the reason was: "What will she do if she becomes highly educated? After all she has to manage the home in future, so what's the need and importance?" So she started to remain at home to help her mother in daily chores.

GSS under the Canon-CAF Project at Firozpur Namak village, in 2017, started to organize muhalla meetings and community meetings in the village and Ruksana's residence was also present in our intervention area. Our team generated awareness among the community members about the importance of girl's education and constantly followed such cases of drop outs through home visits. Gradually the attitude of Ruksana's parents started to change and in 2017 they once again enrolled her in the school.

As of the reporting period she is continuing her studies in class VIII and her roll no. is 6. She is also a regular and active member of our Resource Centre. Our team is constantly motivating her guardians and other parents like them to change their conservative approach towards girl's education and support their girl's progress.

Kartila, 16 years old girl from Firozpur Namak, Nuh, studying in class X at Firozpur Namak School. Her family includes her parents, two sisters and one brother. All her siblings are studying at the same school with her. From early childhood Kartila was a very timid girl and always kept to herself. During two years of our intervention at the Firozpur Namak School, various positive changes were observed in Kartila's personality.

She attended our Resource Centre and initially was not very regular. But gradually she developed interest in the Resource Centre and its activities and became a regular and active member. The interactive sessions of the Centre helped her in finding her inner potential and confidence.

On 11 August, 2017, GSS with the support of Canon India observed Independence Day and Kartila participated actively. She sang Welcome song, National Anthem and also took part in other cultural activities like Kawwali. Before the stage performance she rehearsed again and again and GSS provided the support to make her performance perfect. For the first time she performed in front of more than 1000 people. During her performance she was very confident and joyful. Her family members were also very happy to see her perform so confidently. Today Kartila is a very cheerful and confident girl who actively participates in school activities and is discovering her true potential and dreams.

❖ Project at Asiaki Gorawas Village, Haryana: Sports Complex

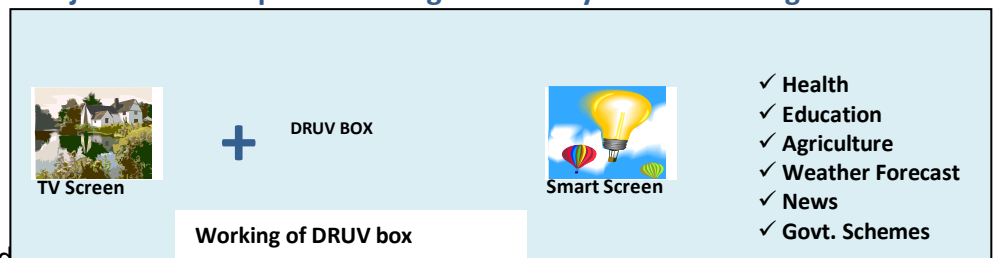
Asiaki Gorawas is a village in Rewari district of Haryana which is located 17 Km from Rewari and consists of about 800 households (4500 population). It has a Senior Secondary School with about 450 students. About 30% of youth are engaged in sports and athletics and some of them are state and national level players. About 200 girls of this village are active in sports and athletics. During current session total 73 Girls participated in different sports like: Kabbadi – 1, Kusti - 04, Kho Kho – 20, Race – 12, Discus throw – 5, Basket ball – 18, Javelin throw– 03



In order to promote the sports culture and its career prospective, GSS with the support of **Diageo India (United Spirits Ltd.)** decided to construct a **Sports Complex** as desired by the people of the village at Gram Panchayat owned land. This land is available at the center of the village and is covered by a boundary wall up to 3 ft height.

❖ Project DRUV at Tonk district of Rajasthan: A step towards Digital Literacy and e-Learning

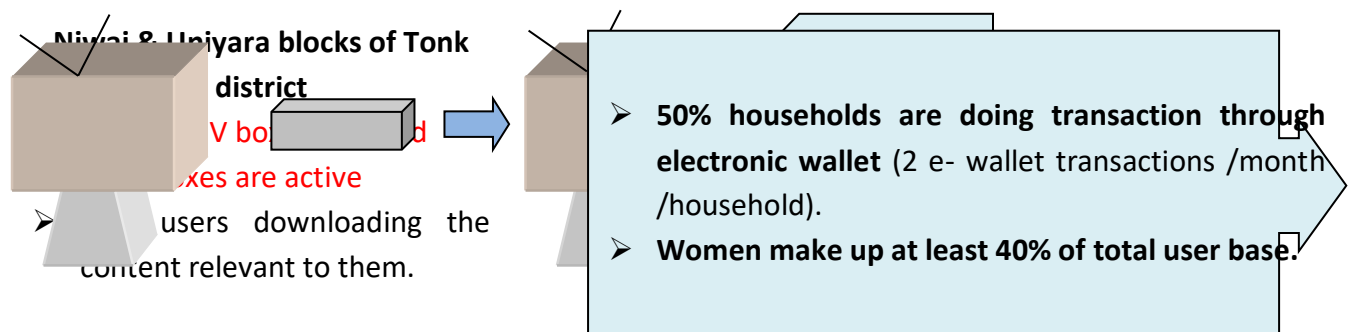
DRUV provides digital empowerment to citizens, specifically in the rural areas, irrespective of their literacy levels by enabling access to select, relevant services and



governance on demand. It is a new approach to community development and uses innovative technology to help transform the lives of rural and remote population in India. The project is already operational in Rajasthan and is fully funded by **Tata Trusts** and is being implemented in **partnership with Prodea Systems, USA**. Since its inception DRUV has the support of Department of IT & Communication, Government of Rajasthan.

DRUV Box turns TV screen into a Smart Screen enabling users to access information and communicate with important Government and Non-Governmental Organizations for availing important and beneficial services or information in the area of health, education, livelihood, agriculture, weather forecast, news, and government schemes.

❖ Project SHE (Sanitation, Health and Empowerment), at Alwar :

A New Classroom Constructed

Under our objective of 'Promotion of Girl's Education', we partnered with **DIAGEO India** to construct a 20 X 38 square ft **class room along with stairs, railing and door at Govt. Girls' Sr. Secondary School, Devi ji ki Gali, Alwar**, where about 300 girls students are enrolled. This initiative improved the school infrastructure which was initially not sufficient to cater the needs of the students.

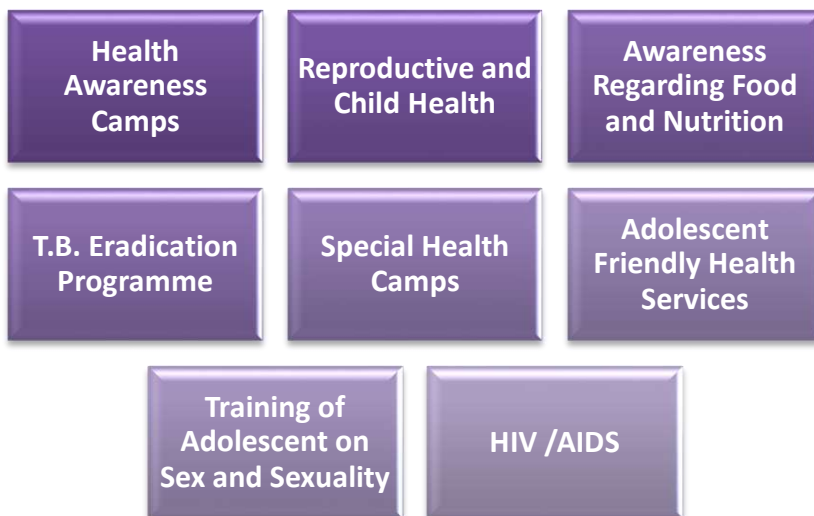

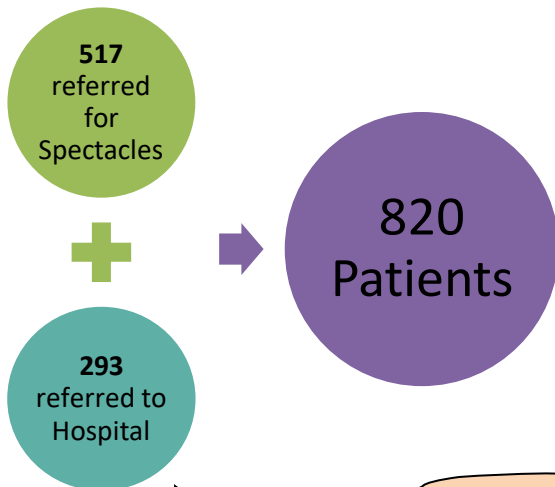

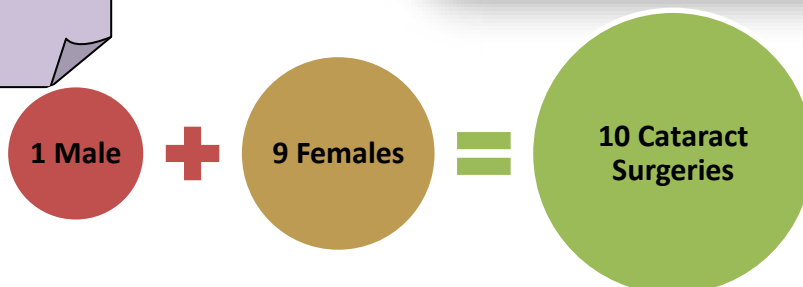

❖ Project SHE (Sanitation, Health and Empowerment), at Alwar and Udaipur

A large number of water borne diseases, skin, eye and gynaecological complications were found during the base line survey and to help the community, GSS under SHE project with the support of **CAF** and **Diageo India (USL)** started Health initiative and established a **Community Health Care Centre (CHCC)** and **Referral Centre** at Alwar and Udaipur districts respectively.

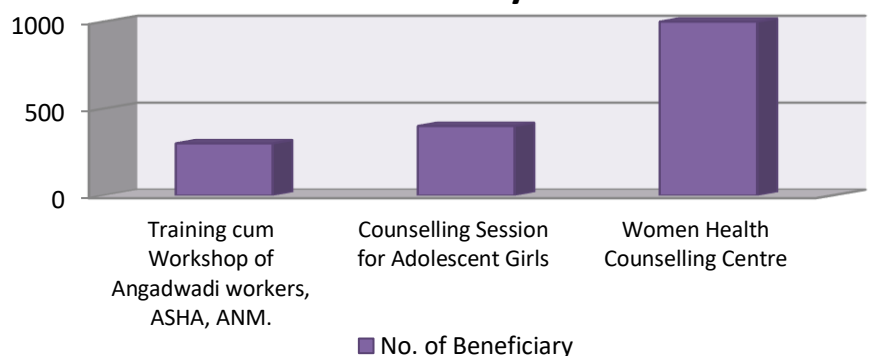
4 Training cum workshops attended by **300 Anganwadi workers, ASHA and ANM** at Alwar and Udaipur fields.

Main objective was to increase the **number of institutional delivery** and increase the **use of sanitary napkins** among the female population including adolescents within the project areas.

✚ Counselling Session with Adolescent Girls and Women:

400 adolescent girls from 5 villages of Alwar and Udaipur districts attended the sessions. These sessions helped the girls in clearing their doubts, myths and fears about the common problems like physical, behavioural, psychological and

emotional changes and related health problems of adolescence. Along with this, girls and women were counseled about the personal hygiene and its importance.

✚Set up and running of Women Health Counselling Centre:

This Centre was primarily established to address health concerns of women and adolescents especially related to hygiene, menstrual hygiene and sanitation. Availability of sanitary pads was a key component to address Hygiene-sanitation concerns along with information on other health aspects. More than **1000 women and adolescent girls** benefited by this initiative.

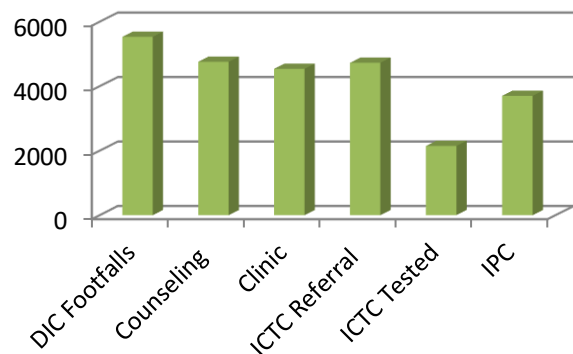

3. Sanitation in Govt. School Thali, Chaksu, Jaipur



Our projects are aimed:

- Towards conservation of water resources and promotion of water harvesting for sustainable use in future through adoption of Integrated Water Resource Management (IWRM), Rainwater Harvesting, etc.
- To increase agricultural productivity and improve quality of land (soil, moisture, fertility, etc.)
- To improve accessibility and availability of potable drinking water for the community.
- To improve the health and well being, particularly of women and children by improving the environment quality.
- To create environmental awareness in people regarding resource degradation, depletion, conservation and regeneration of degraded resources.

Integrated Water Resource Management (IWRM)

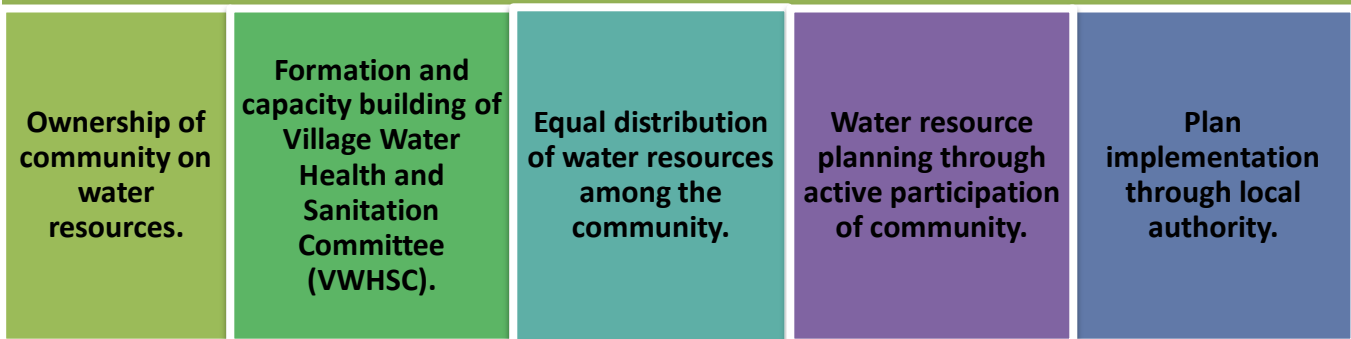
IWRM: As per Technical Committee of the Global Water Partnership (GWP), is "a process which promotes the coordinated development and management of water, land and related resources, in order to maximize the resultant: economic and social welfare in an equitable manner without compromising the sustainability of vital ecosystems."

3 Principles of IWRM

- ✓ **Social Equity:** ensuring equal access for all users (particularly marginalized and poorer user groups)
- ✓ **Economic Efficiency:** bringing the greatest benefit to the greatest number of users possible with the available resources
- ✓ **Environmental Sustainability:** requires that aquatic ecosystems are acknowledged as users and that adequate allocation is made to sustain their natural functioning.



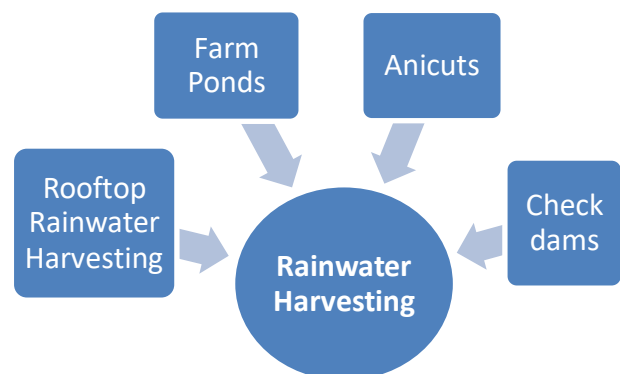
IWRM Components



Rainwater Harvesting (RWH):

GSS aims to promote rainwater harvesting initiatives as today there is a crisis of water which can only be solved if we harvest and utilize the available rainwater which otherwise is lost either through evaporation or through run-off losses. There are different techniques through which RWH can be done:

- Checking run-off and providing run-off more time to penetrate the surface and recharge groundwater along with increasing the availability of surface water through construction of check dams, anicuts, farm ponds etc.
- Storing and utilizing the rainwater through rooftop rainwater harvesting.

❖ Project at Government Senior Secondary School, Firozpur Namak, Nuh, Haryana



Solar Inverter

- was present at school but non-functional.
- GSS with the support of **CAF and Canon India** repaired the inverter.

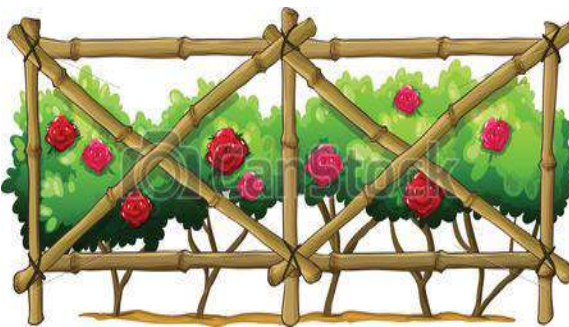
Installation of Solar Lights

- **10 Street Solar Lights** at the school premises were installed.
- This helped in maintaining the security of the school campus and reduced unlawful activities.



Plantation

- Total **35 saplings** were planted within the school campus out of which **25 survived**.
- **20 fencing guard** for the growth and development of plants, better safety, and protection of plants.

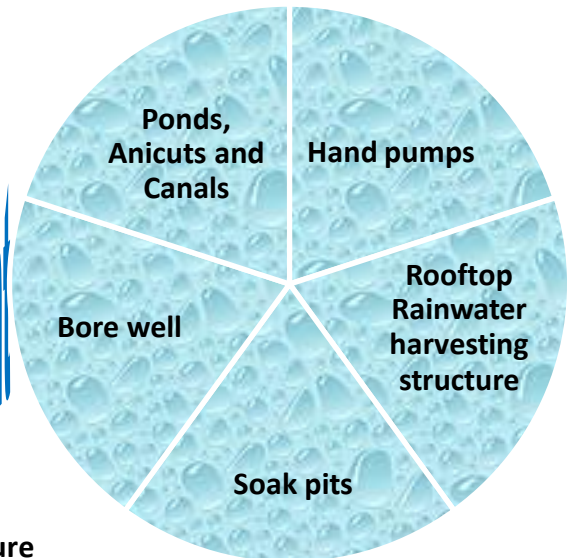
➤ Construction and Repair of Soak Pits

- 65 new soak pits were constructed.
- Old existing soak pits, which were defunct, were also repaired.

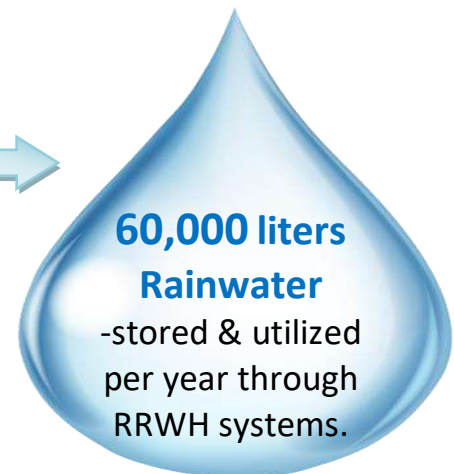

➤ Construction of Rooftop Rainwater Harvesting (RRWH) Structure

- 2 Rooftop Rainwater Harvesting structures were constructed at 2 schools by GSS.
- Location: Government Senior Secondary Schools at Village Goondpur and Sayad Kherli.

This initiative directly helped more than **1300 students and school staff** by providing safe drinking water.

➤ Desilting and Repair of Ponds, Anicuts and Canals

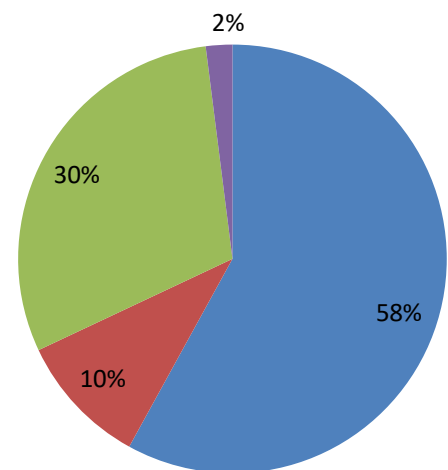
- Industrialization of targeted area led to withdrawal of huge quantity of ground water on daily basis increasing the pressure on groundwater draft.
- To check this crisis GSS took the initiatives to recharge groundwater by desilting of ponds and canals and construction of anicuts.
- This initiative also increased the availability of surface water.

➤ With Diageo's support GSS undertook its Water Conservation Programme in Shahjahanpur district of Uttar Pradesh at Rosa Village and desilted and repaired 10 ponds.

➤ Awareness for water conservation

GSS spread the awareness about importance of keeping water resources clean and uncontaminated and about the water conservation practices and techniques among the **6000 community members** under this initiative.



➤ Kitchen Garden Plantation



Under our objective of **multiple use of water**, at Udaipur we initiated the concept of maintaining kitchen gardens by using waste water draining from the drinking water sources **like RO waste water**. By using the waste water, beneficiaries cultivated a variety of vegetables that improved nutritional value of around **2500 villagers**. It also helped in saving money and provided easy access to costly vegetables. Consequently, this initiative brought a positive effect on the environment protection too.

CASE STUDY: Hand Pump Repair near Choki Bai's House

At Girva village of Udaipur district, when GSS with the support of Diageo India (USL) conducted community meetings, it was found that there was a shortage of water as many hand pumps of the village are not functioning properly and people used to struggle daily to fulfill their water demands. GSS surveyed the area to assess the water sources of the village and decided to repair the defunct hand pumps to solve the water crisis. During the survey one such hand pump, which was non-functional for more than a decade, was found near Choki Bai's house. People of that locality told us, "10 years ago this hand pump used to work but for last few years it has stopped working and we have to go near the bus stand to bring water by standing in long queues for hours which is affecting our work. Children often do not take bath as there is shortage of water. If this water problem can be solved in some way then it will help us a lot." Thus, GSS & USL repaired the hand pump and brought back smiles to many faces. **10 families comprising of 47 people** benefitted from this initiative and their life is back to normal. In the entire area **35 such hand pumps were repaired** which directly benefitted around **1100 people of 180 families**.

❖ Sanitation in Govt. School Thali, Chaksu, Jaipur

This project was supported by **SPX Flow, Jaipur** under its CSR initiatives. This project was basically Sanitation and Hygiene oriented and was carried out under WASH theme but as we realized the need of plantation to manage the waste water of RO for maintaining the cleanliness of the campus, we took this initiative additional to the proposed activities under MoU of the project.



- Total **100 saplings** were planted.
- This helped in maintaining the cleanliness of the campus by utilizing the waste water draining from the water station and also helped in developing green space in the school campus.

❖ Integrated Water Resource Management Project at Pali, Rajasthan

Formation of VWHSCs

- GSS conducted Community Meetings to explain the ground water raised the awareness and interest of the villagers towards the cause which led to the formation of **24 Village Water Health and Sanitation Committees (VWHSCs) in 24 Gram Panchayats of Desuri block of Pali district.**
- VWHSCs are headed by Sarpanch and comprises of Ward Panch, NGO workers, Head Teachers, ANM, Anganwadi workers, SHG members and villagers etc. as their members.

Need Assessment

- VWHSC meeting collaboratively identified village level water related problems by assessing needs of the villagers and prioritized them according to magnitude of problem. The committee identified several problems related to water, health, sanitation, security etc.

Focus Group Discussion (FGD)

- This aimed to gather people to discuss water related issues in their villages that were affecting other aspects of their life.
- In FGD villagers were allowed to agree or disagree with each other's point of view and it provided an insight to the group to think about issue of water that exists in the villages in terms of their beliefs, experiences and practices

Transit Work

- This was done to identify the need of the villagers and to understand the actual ground conditions of the villages by GSS team along with the villagers by walking through the villages and examining the situation. It helped GSS to identify the core areas and prioritizing the needs.

Participatory Rural Appraisal (PRA)

- It involved local people in the analysis and interpretation of their own village's situation.
- The main objective was to identify the natural, human and economic resources of villages, to identify the village problems and prioritize them with the help of villagers, and to prepare action plan for water resource management for the village. Some major findings over PRA:
 - Scarcity of drinking water as well drinking water sources in villages.
 - Salinity in ground water. - Presence of fluoride in water. - Improper drainage system of villages.
 - Stagnation of dirty water. - Open defecation in the villages. - A huge demand of water in irrigation.
 - Low water flow in Ground Level Reservoir (GLR). - Initiative of PHED is not proper.
 - No availability of drinking water in Anganwadi centre. - Run-off of rain water from roof etc.
 - Water logging situation in front of Anganwadi centre and school during monsoon.

Resource Mapping

- By involving local community GSS prepared village resource map as perceived by community / water users to solicit their participation. Infrastructure, services and other village resources such as agricultural lands, wells, wastelands, drainage system, GLR, tube well, ponds, Anicuts, schools, PHC, water resources etc. were mapped.

Water budgeting & Planning

- GSS along with the VWHSC members and community people, prepared water budget of each household including how much water is used for drinking, domestic purpose, for animal, agriculture, industrial use and other cultural and social uses of water.
- According to water budget, water planning was also done by active participation of VWHSC and community people. This water planning includes the following:
 - Mapping of water bodies where water is available.
 - How much water is available on surface?
 - How much water as rainfall and groundwater is available?
 - How much usage of water and how much scarcity of water is there?
 - How we can manage this scarcity?

Plan formation and presentation to Gram Sabha

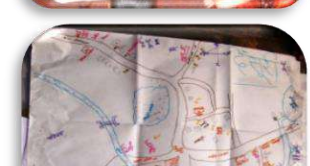
- According to water planning a concrete sustainable plan was prepared by the VWHSC and the community.
- Planning was represented by the committee to the Gram Sabha to get the consent as well to improve the planning to get more effectiveness.

Plan approval from Block and District level

- After approval from the Gram Sabha, the plan is presented in front of Block level and District level authorities and after their approval it was submitted to the respective departments along with the budget to have their sanction and support

Implementation of Plan by Gram Panchayat with Community Participation

This is in process and further implementation of plan depends on the approval by govt. departments.



4. Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH)

WASH is the collective term for Water, Sanitation and Hygiene used within international development and is the focus of Sustainable Development Goal 6. Due to their interdependent nature, these three core issues are grouped together to represent a growing sector. While each a separate field of work, each is dependent on the presence of the other.

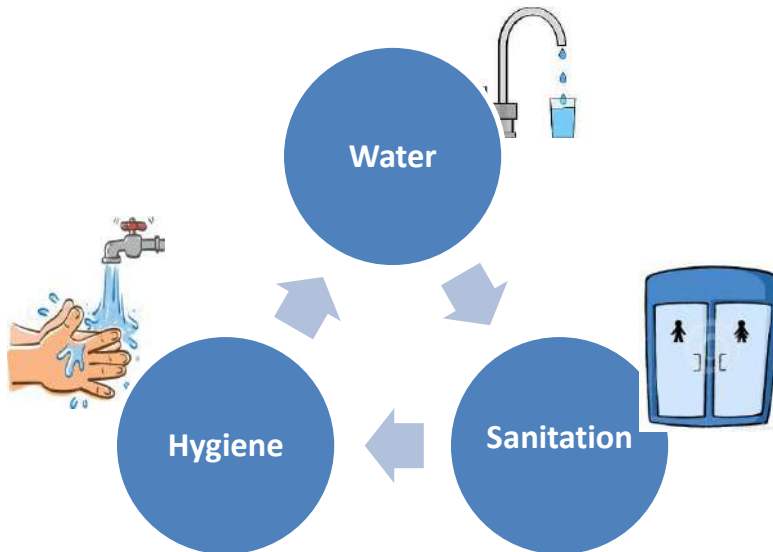
GSS undertake the projects under this theme by working on the following:

Water

- Access to Safe Drinking Water: Repair of Hand pumps, Installation of RO filters, digging of bore wells, etc.

Sanitation & Hygiene

- Cleanliness, hygiene, hand washing practice, open defecation free villages, construction of toilets in schools, etc.



Projects:

1. Holistic Development Project at Government Senior Secondary School, Firozpur Namak, Nuh, Haryana.
2. Sanitation, Health and Empowerment (SHE) Project, Alwar & Udaipur.
3. Support My School (SMS) Programme at Rajasthan and Haryana.



Our Achievements:

❖ Project at Government Senior Secondary School, Firozpur Namak, Nuh, Haryana

Under WASH theme we covered the following areas at the school with the support of **CAF & Canon India**:

Construction of water station & toilets: A clean and hygienic water station was constructed along with the toilets in another section of the

Beneficiary:

1500 school students and staff.

Repairing of existing toilets: project team repaired 6 water taps in the toilets. All six taps were either damaged or stolen by local anti social elements.

Installation of RO filter: RO system was installed for providing safe drinking water to all the students. The RO system is running properly and drinking water station is also well maintained. Annual maintenance of RO has been completed.

Awareness about sanitation and hygiene: The IEC materials regarding different Government schemes, Water and sanitation, Personal hygiene are displayed in Village and Atal Seva Kendra for creating awareness among the community.

Dustbin Distribution: Makeover of the school by our intervention motivated the Sarpanch of the village and he committed to provide dustbins for the betterment of the school and accordingly nine dustbins were fixed in different corner of the school.

Painting of Resource Centre: Repainting of the resource center was done in order to maintain the cleanliness of the premises.

Meeting with adolescent boys and girls: Total Beneficiary=70
Two meetings were conducted to aware them on health, personal hygiene, menstrual hygiene and sanitation.



❖ Sanitation, Health and Empowerment (SHE) Project, Alwar & Udaipur, Rajasthan

➤ Construction of new drainage and repairing of old drainage system

- As the drainage system of Goondpur village was damaged, non-functional and contaminating the entire locality GSS **laid 500m of new drainage system** for proper discharge of waste water.
- **100m of old drainage system was repaired** by GSS to improve the sanitation condition of the village.



➤ Construction of Bore Well

Beneficiary: 500+

- GSS constructed bore well at Goondpur Secondary School.
- **500 students** directly got access to drinking water along with the teachers and villagers.



➤ Repair of Hand pumps

- **65 old hand pumps were repaired** in 6 villages of Alwar & Udaipur.

Beneficiary 4500+



➤ Installation of water tank, RO water purifier, water cooler and fitting of Pipes

- Due to presence of high quantity of fluoride and nitrate in groundwater in the targeted area, health of the children was being affected adversely, thus GSS under this project aimed at providing safe drinking water to the schools.
- **Six water tanks along with RO water purifier, water cooler, pipe line fittings and taps** were installed to provide safe drinking water to the school children of 6 villages of Alwar and Udaipur.



Beneficiary: 2300+ students & staff

➤ Formation and Strengthening Village Water Health & Sanitation Committee

- GSS took initiative to form and strengthen Village Water Health & Sanitation Committee for sustainability of the WASH objectives.
- A total **120 VWHSC members got technical training** about maintenance & proper utilization of water resources and monitoring of health and sanitation condition of the villages.

Beneficiary: 5000 community members

➤ Awareness Camp on sanitation

- Awareness and information generated on Swachh Bharat Mission and community people were encouraged to construct toilets under Swachh Bharat Mission Scheme in order to make Goondpur 'ODF Village'.

Beneficiary: 1000 people

➤ Hand Wash Practice among School Children

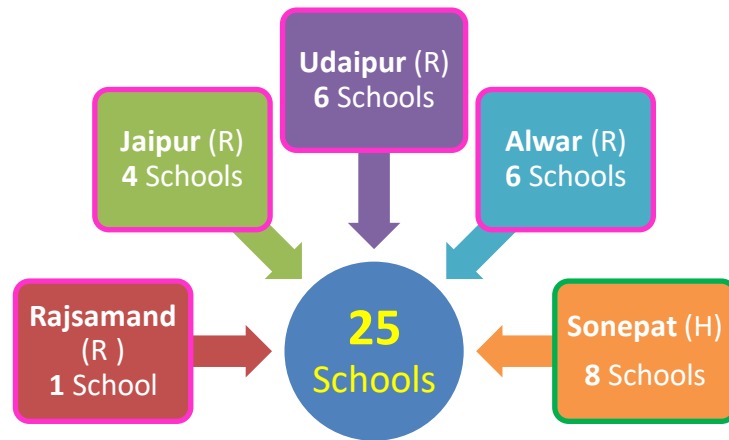
- GSS encouraged students of Govt. Schools of the targeted areas to make a habit to wash hand after using toilets and before taking food to check the spread of infectious diseases.

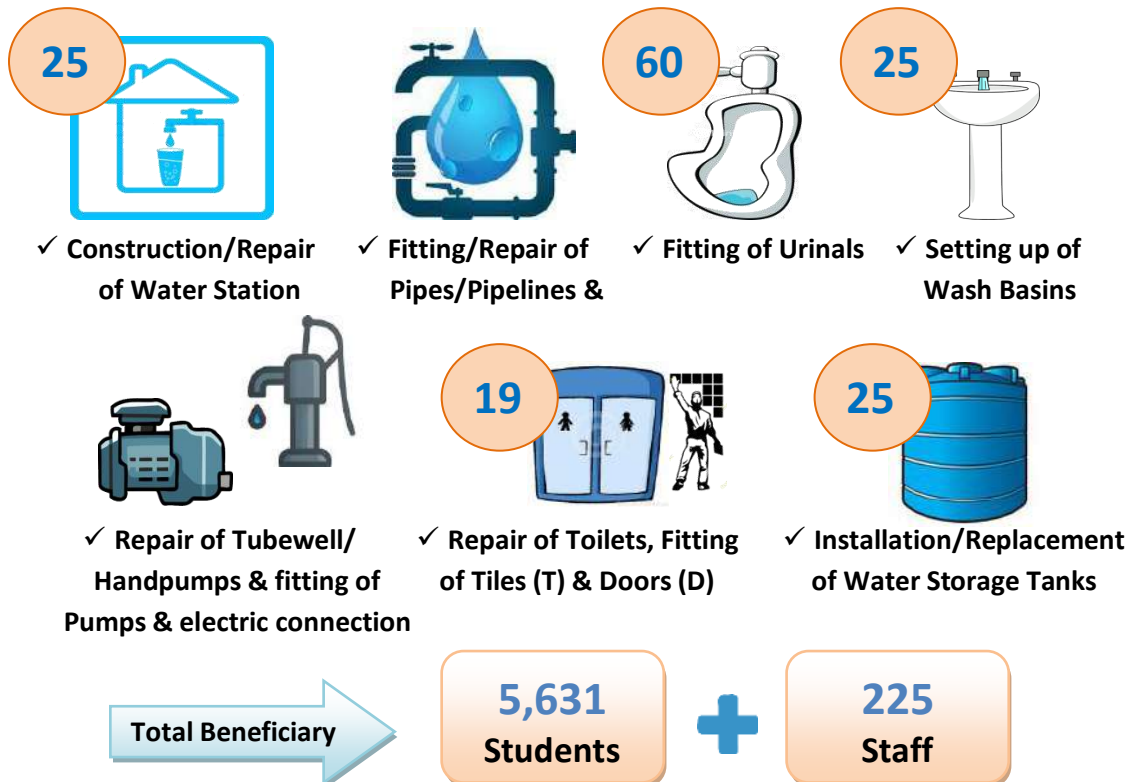


❖ Support My School (SMS) Programme at Rajasthan and Haryana

This programme was supported by **Coca Cola** and **CAF** and aimed at maintaining basic amenities like toilet, access to water and basic infrastructure at schools.

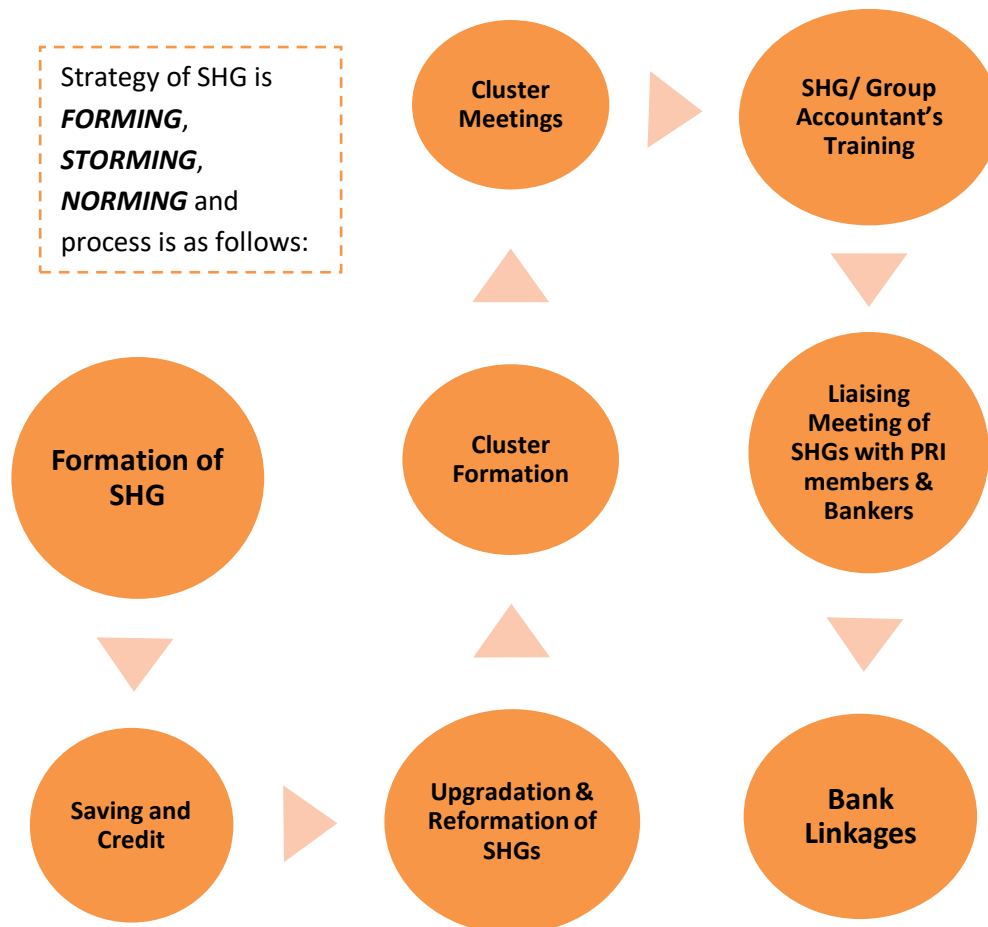

Women Empowerment is one of the important themes of GSS in its working area to ensure holistic development of the community by curbing the inherent gender inequalities, fighting orthodoxies and conservative mindsets. Our project focuses on women empowerment through **SHGs to make them economically, socially and psychologically strong who can participate in decision making process and advocate their rights in society.**

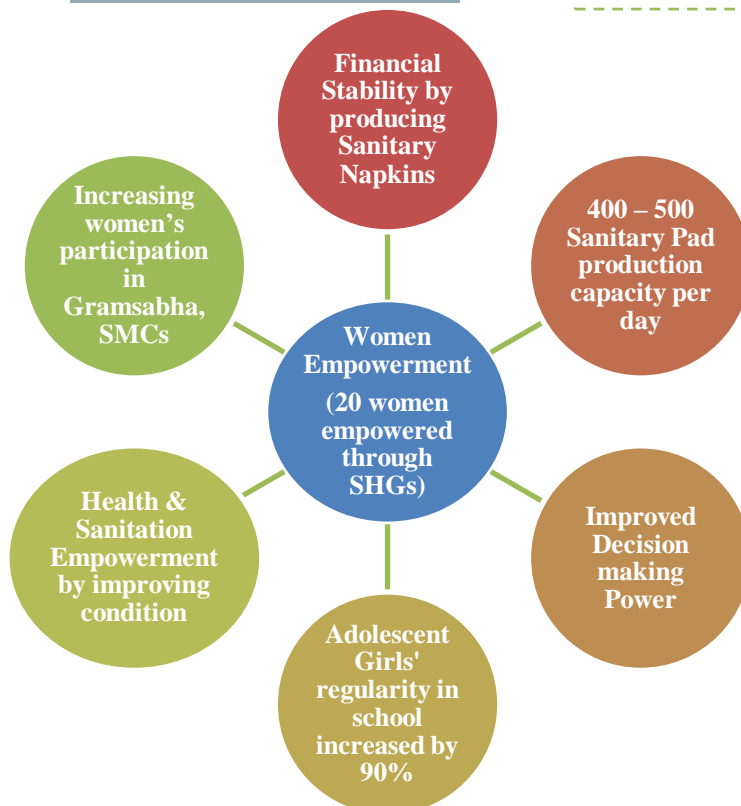

❖ Sanitation, Health and Empowerment (SHE) Project, Alwar, Rajasthan

STREE (Livelihood/Sanitary Napkin)

Location: Goondpur Village,
Alwar, Rajasthan

- ✓ Provided livelihood options to the women of the community.
- +
- ✓ Improved the personal hygiene & menstrual hygiene practices of women and girls by making sanitary napkins easily available in the village.



In order to instill confidence and a sense of being economically self reliant and empowered, the women of the area were mobilized to rise against the inequalities of the society by being a part of **SHG on Manufacturing of Sanitary Napkins 'STREE'**. This helped the targeted beneficiaries to improve their livelihood by selling of napkins through **social marketing by the support of ASHA & Anganwadi Workers**.

Currently, **20 women** (10 in manufacturing & 10 in marketing) are engaged in the SHG and selling the napkins @ Rs. 22/Pack of 6 napkins which provides them with a monthly income of Rs. 5000/member.



CASE STUDY: Empowering Sheela by finding her Financial Self-Reliance

A simple housewife in a rural setting following the conservative traditions of living behind the veil with no voice of her own and with no skills to obtain economic self-sufficiency--- this was Sheela's story in a nutshell, before GSS with the support of Diageo India entered the Goondpur Village and implemented SHE project. Our Project Coordinator Ms.



Chandrakala mobilized the womenfolk of the village and generated awareness about different topics related to health, hygiene, and empowerment through **enhancing their skills and how SHGs can transform their lives by giving them an opportunity to work in their own village**. Some proactive women like Sheela came forward to learn new skills and change their life socially & financially by becoming a part of the **SHG on Sanitary Napkins – STREE**.

Sheela became a part of our initiative in 2014 and developed skills for manufacturing, packing and selling of sanitary napkins at our Centre at Goondpur village by undergoing **10 days technical and hands on training by the experts and 2 days refresher training**.

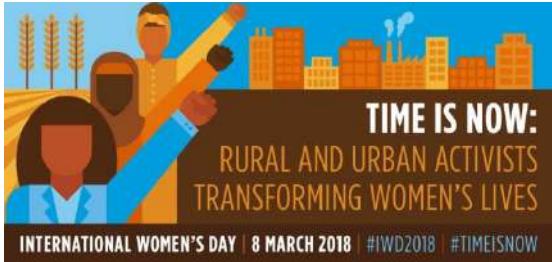
Now she is an active member of the SHG who took a brave step towards fulfilling her dreams of economic self-sufficiency to improve her family's living standard and earns a

monthly income of Rs. 5000. She has not just found an opportunity to become **economically empowered** but is also a **source of inspiration for other women of the village** as she has found a **new voice, confidence and developed leadership skills** to motivate other women to come forward with their problems and join their hands to solve them.

6. Observation of Special Days

8th March: International Women's Day Celebrations

- ❖ GSS mobilized adolescent girls, women, and youth to celebrate this day and discussed about status of women in society, social evils like female foeticide and rights of women, girl education, livelihood generation and overall women empowerment.



- ❖ At Nuh (Haryana) under CAF-Canon Project, around 70 women participated in the event and at Alwar, under Diageo India's SHE Project, around 1000 women, adolescent girls and youth took part in the celebrations.

5th June: World Environment Day Celebrations

- ❖ GSS observed World Environment Day by mobilizing and generating awareness among the communities about the importance of environment, groundwater exploitation and its effects, avoiding use of plastic bags, reuse/recycle of plastic, rain water harvesting, importance of trees/forests, effect of global warming, etc. We focused on the little changes and choices that an individual can make in order to contribute towards sustainable development and environment conservation.

- ❖ Plantation drives were undertaken by our teams in our intervention areas. At Nuh, Haryana, 10 tree saplings were planted to spread the message among the school children and 120 students and staff participated in the event.



- ❖ At Alwar & Udaipur (SHE project), 500 plantations, 2000 sapling distribution, tying band on trees to protect them and taking oath to protect the trees and environment was accomplished by around 1000 villagers with the support of our team.

These events also played important role in making the community conscious about the history and importance of Independence Day and Republic Day along with the relevance of the Constitution and its ideals.
- ❖ At Firozpur Namak School (Nuh, Haryana), school bags were distributed by the Canon India team among the students. Around 1000 people of the village participated in these events. 1100 community people including school children and staff were part of these events.
- ❖ At Goondpur village school, Alwar, our teams celebrated the days with the school children and staff.



5th September: Teacher's Day Celebrations

- ❖ Teacher's day was observed by organizing drawing competition and imparting information about Teacher's Day.
- ❖ At Firozpur Namak School, Nuh (Haryana), school staff, administration and students participated in the event and pens were distributed to the teachers.

Gramodaya Samajik Sansthan (the Institution/ Society) is a Registered under The Rajasthan Society Registration Act, 1958 vide Society Deed dated 13th March 1989. The Rules and Regulation governing the Society are primarily governed by the Society deed apart from the Act and Rules framed by the Government from time to time.

Object of the Institution are wholly Charitable and all the activities centered towards public charitable purposes are for the public at large. Surplus arising out of the activities of the Society are exclusively meant to be utilized for such charitable purposes only.

In pursuit of the objects of the Institution/Society, the Institution is undertakes various social projects funded by the Government Agencies and other Private Organizations. The Society has activities in the states of Rajasthan and Other States.

ii) ACCOUNTING CONVENTION:

The Society follows mercantile system of accounting and revenue/income & cost/expenditure are generally accounted on accrual basis. Accounting policies not referred to otherwise are consistent with generally accepted accounting principles.

iii) REVENUE RECOGNITION:

Revenue in respect to other income is recognized as and when a reasonable certainty to its realization exists.

iv) VOLUNTARY CONTRIBUTIONS:

Voluntary contributions received with specific direction that they should form part of the Corpus of the Institution/society, are recognized and credited to the Corpus fund.

Voluntary contributions received with specific direction for projects have been utilized for specific projects. Excess/ shortage in the project is transferred to the Income and Expenditure Account at the end of the project.

v) FIXED ASSETS AND DEPRECIATION:

Fixed assets are stated at written down value as reduced by depreciation charged during the year. Further, fixed asset acquired from the grant is stated at cost and is represented by equivalent amount on liability side as Capital Grant in aid (except Rs. 74820/- Assets in TI Project). All expenses directly attributable to acquisition of the fixed assets are capitalized and considered as part of those assets.

The fixed assets are capitalized on the date; the asset is installed or commissioned for use.

Depreciation on fixed assets is provided on written down value method at the rates and method specified in the Income Tax Act, 1961. No depreciation is charged on fixed assets which have been sold/ discarded during the current financial year. Further, no depreciation is charged on assets acquired from the grant.

vi) EMPLOYEE BENEFITS:

Short term employee benefits are charged off in the year in which the related service is rendered.

No provision is made in respect of leave to the credit of the employees, since it is not encashable.

vii) PROVISION OF INCOME TAX:

The Institution/Society is engaged in carrying out charitable activities. Accordingly, income of trust is wholly exempt from tax u/s. 11 of the Income Tax Act, 1961 subject to compliance with provisions of the Income Tax Act, 1961; therefore, No Provision of Tax is made in the Books of Accounts.

viii) EXPENSES RELATED TO PROJECTS:

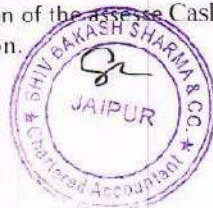
Various expenses incurred at Institution office are recovered from projects. Thus, the expenses of projects include certain expenses incurred at the Institution office.

ix) GRANT RECEIVABLE OR UNSPENT GRANT:

The trust on receipt of confirmation / adhoc payment from the funding agencies initiates the charitable activities. At the end of the year, excess of grant received over expenses is transferred to Unspent Grant and to Grant Receivable in cases where expenses incurred are in excess of grant received.

2. NOTES TO ACCOUNTS

- i) In the opinion of the management, current assets, loans & advances are approximately of the value stated in the balance sheet, if realized in the ordinary course.
- ii) Balances of receivables, payables and loans & advances are subject to reconciliation and confirmation. These balances are therefore, subject to adjustments, if any, as may be required on settlement of these balances with the parties.
- iii) There is no cash payment in excess of Rs.10000 as has been certified by the management of the Institution, However it is not possible for us to verify the payment in excess of Rs.10000/- made otherwise than by crossed cheque or bank draft as the necessary evidences are not in possession of the assessee. Cash balances are accepted as certified by the management of Institution.
